

Chino Hills High teachers use training time to focus on instructional collaboration

Chino Hills High teachers dedicated their professional development day on Sept. 21 to evaluating their Professional Learning Communities (PLCs), the time they collaborate to focus on student learning.

Partnering with Solution Tree's David LaRose, Superintendent of Culver City Unified School District, teachers discussed key considerations for effective PLCs.

Additionally, Chino Hills High teachers discussed what they "celebrate, monitor and confront" about their PLCs.

They discussed the Fantastic 4 of PLCs: 1-One Fundamental Purpose, 2-Two Core Beliefs, 3-Three Big Ideas of PLCs, 4-Four Guiding Questions of Highly Effective Teams/Schools.

In the afternoon, the teachers learned about the importance of "owning" their PLCs and how to use the time effectively to focus on improving student learning.

"The way we implement PLCs is crucial in how we build collaborative relationships to further student achievement," said Grace Lee, Chino Valley Unified School District's Director of Professional Development. "Chino Hills High's investment of professional development time in revisiting and refining their PLCs will ultimately impact student learning."
