






Ms. Zhang 柠子老师

- Ms. Zhang's students and Mrs. Ma's students will switch during English Instruction time.
- During English Instruction time, there will be 20 mins of Math bridging and 70 mins of ELA.
- ELA: Reading Comprehension strategies & skills, phonics, high frequency words, vocabulary, grammar, and writing.
- Math Bridging: transfer the academic content they have learned Mandarin to English



Accelerated Reading

- A minimum of 20 minutes of reading per night
- Use ARbookfinder.com to find the level of the book and also the AR quiz number. Not all books have a designated AR number that allows a student to take an AR quiz. To see if your choice of book has an AR number, you can search by the book title.
- We will have students keep a few pages of AR reading logs in their homework folder. In the logs, they will need to list the book title, and the AR quiz number of the book. They will need to keep their logs in their folder so that they can take them out when they're ready for the quiz.
 - AR quizzes will be taken in the classroom.
 - We will start AR as soon as the roster is populated into the platform.

I-Ready

- Students take a computerized test in both language arts and math to determine their current levels. They should only complete diagnostic tests at school.
- I-Ready lessons will be taken mostly at home. Students who finish their class work quickly might have some time for I-Ready lessons in class.
- Students will be rewarded each trimester for passing a minimum of two lessons weekly on the I-Ready ELA program and another two lessons weekly on the I-Ready Math program. Students who do so all three trimesters will be invited to a glow dance party at the end of the year.
- We will start I-Ready lessons next week as we are completing the diagnostic test this week.

In Class

At home

- Students will read at least two assigned books appropriate for their level so as to solidify and raise their level. The more the better.
- Parents are encouraged to have students retell the story using story map (handout)
- Students will get exposed to and practice

high frequency words (handout)

Math Home Support

- Daily homework worksheet
- Practice Adding and subtracting numbers within 100

Attendance

- It is important that our young scholars show up to school every day so as to assure academic success!
- If your child will be absent for three or more consecutive days, please inform us.



Homework Policy

- Mandarin, Math, and ELA worksheets will usually be sent home daily on M-Th. However, there might be days when homework is not sent home due to schedule. We will keep you informed of any changes.
- Read at least 20 minutes per night
- Incomplete/missing assignments may result in completing work during fun class activities
- Consistent late, incomplete, and/or poorly done work will result in a lowered homework/ classwork grade
- Your CHILD should be the person most responsible for their own homework



Grading Policy

- Standards Based Report Cards match Common Core Standards-will receive a 4, 3, 2, or 1
- Work that has been reviewed but not graded will be indicated by a stamp, sticker, a check mark, or red correction
- We will grade the following: Mandarin vocab quiz, math quiz, ELA quiz, and Unit tests.
- P.E. Grades: Based on daily effort, participation, and competency. Please make sure appropriate shoes are worn Mon and Tues for P.E.



Behavior System

- Positive reinforcements
- Individual reward charts: students can get a sticker or a stamp on their reward chart for good behaviors. Once they get 20, they can pick a gift from the treasure box.
- We also have a whole class marble jar for the whole class behaviors. We will have a fun class party if they fill the whole jar.
- We will also give out Top Hawks for good behaviors.
 Students then use it as a type of currency for the Top Hawk Store that is open on Fridays during the students lunch time.





Dress Code

- Sneakers and comfortable outwears for P.E.
- Wear leggings when appropriate
- Tank tops or "spaghetti" straps are not allowed.
- Revealing or see-through tops are prohibited.
- Shorts and Skirts should be fingertip length when arms are straight down.
- Hats may be worn while outside
- NO phone or smart-watch in class





Chromebook

- Each student will have a class chromebook checked out to them for classroom assignment use
- Students are directed on specific sites and assignments—computer privileges may be taken away if other websites are accessed without permission
- Procedures and care have been reviewed with students
- Students are responsible for damages
- We recommend that students use wired headphones, not wireless earpods, because their ears are small and big headphones can go around their ears.
- Each student has a ziploc bag to keep their headphones and keep it clean.

- We will send out signup forms for volunteering opportunities at a later time.




Birthdays
