


Where does PBIS come from?

- * PBIS is short for **Positive Behavior Interventions and Support**
- * This comes directly from the 1997 reauthorization of the Individuals with Disabilities Act (IDEA)
- * It is based on principles of applied behavior analysis and the prevention approach and values positive behavior support
- * The focus is having clear expectations and being proactive by recognizing students who demonstrate the expectations

PBIS Guiding Principles



Decisions are always driven by DATA.



Every child can learn expected behavior when they are taught them.

Progress monitoring a student's behavior provides important information.





Why does Anna Borba need PBIS?






Punishments, such as suspension and expulsion, only temporarily remove the problem, but do not address the behavior.

Studies from "zero tolerance" policies revealed that, "80% of inmates were once students with learning disabilities, students from poverty, students who were abused or neglected, students who were minorities, and students who were English learners that did not have the proper supports needed."

- · High Intensity


5-10% Targeted Group Interventions

BE SAFE	* Exit quietly and always walk when dismissed * Keep your hands and feet to yourself * Look for directions from the adult in charge	* Quietly wait your turn * Keep your hands and feet to yourself * Use equipment appropriately * Follow all directions * Tell an adult if you are worried about a friend	* Keep all passwords and personal info safe * Do not engage with strangers * Know the rules of school equipment and use appropriate websites	* Don't worry about what others are doing * Do the right thing, in the right place, at the right time

Talk with your children about how to show RESPECT, RESPONSIBILITY, and how to be SAFE while at home. These are not just "at school" behaviors, they are LIFE-LONG behaviors.
