Homework shall be assigned Monday-Thursday according to the district-adopted guidelines listed below (BP/AR 6154).

Grade 1	10-20 minutes
Grade 2	20-30 minutes
Grade 3	30-45 minutes
Grades 4-8	60-90 minutes

Elementary students are required to read 15-20 minutes every day, in addition to regularly assigned homework. Junior High students shall be required to read a minimum of 30 minutes every day, in addition to regularly scheduled homework.

POSITIVE BEHAVIOR INTERVENTIONS AND SUPPORTS

- 1. Creates and maintains a safe and effective learning environment
- 2. Ensures all students have social skills needed for success at school and beyond

3. Provides a proactive system-wide framework for implementation

THE PURPOSE OF PBIS IS TO ESTABLISH A CLIMATE IN WHICH APPROPRIATE BEHAVIOR IS THE NORM.

IMPLEMENTING PBIS AT HOME

- 5:1 positives to correction
- Set the stage for success, rewards
- Give clear, specific directions
- Stay calm, use calm voice
- Set reasonable limits
- Be consistent, YES means YES, NO means NO
- · Set example, actions speak louder than words
- Proactively anticipate situation
- · Have patience, a little goes a long way
- Have fun and enjoy the ride!

REWARDS & CONSEQUENCES

REWARDS-

As students show behavior following the expectations, they will move their clip up the clip-chart. Each time they clip up, there is a reward associated with it.

CONSEQUENCES-

After 3 sequential verbal warnings for the same action, the student will receive a Rethinking Letter to reflect on their behavior. This will be sent home for a parent to sign.

Student Birthdays & Class Treats

Birthdays can be an exciting time for students, and we want to recognize their special day; our teachers will do their best to verbally recognize birthdays. However, in order to minimize loss of instructional time, and to follow our wellness policy, treats and goodie bags are not to be brought to school. We ask that you do not place a teacher in an awkward position by asking them if you can have a party or bring in cupcakes, cakes, goodie bags, etc.

Gifts/balloons/flowers should not be sent to the school. If these items are brought to school, they will remain in the office until the end of the day.

SCHOOL Policies

Attendance

- Students are expected to be at school (unless it is an excused reason). Each day of school should provide an important learning experience, and if your child(ren) are not in class, they miss the learning continuity.
- Board Policy requires a parent verification of each absence within 5 school days of the student's return to school. On the sixth day, the absence becomes unverified and cannot be changed. State law requires that each absence be cleared.
