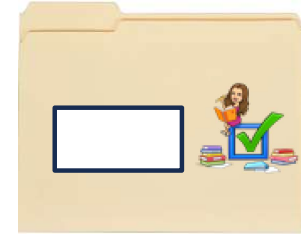

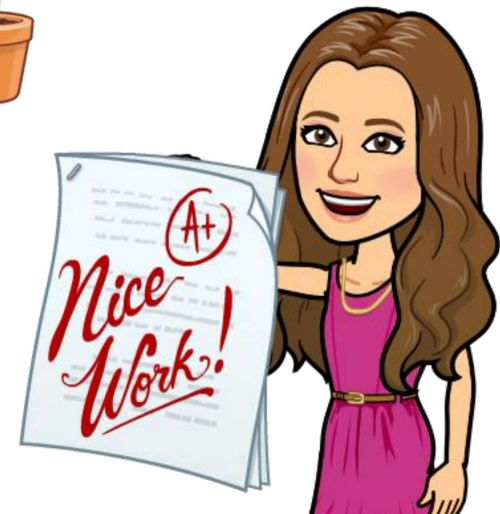

- 3 incidents will result in an office referral.

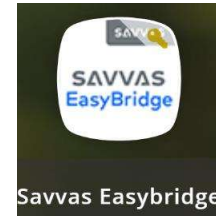
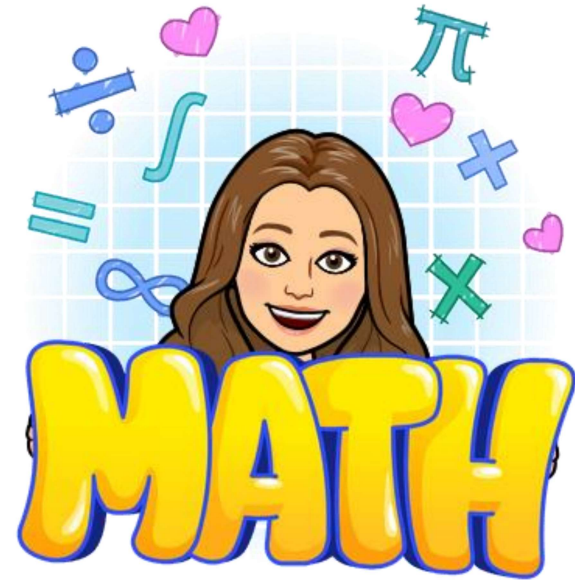
