Classroom Expectations

- Students should arrive to class on time with all materials.
- Students should not share their login information or passwords with others.
- Students should put all electronic devices away unless instructed by the instructor for classroom instruction.
- Upon arriving in class, students should place their cellphone in the phone charging station to their assigned number.
- Once class begins you should not be voicing (you may sign to each other). All communication will be conducted in ASL (unless otherwise stated).
- Student area should be clear of backpacks or personal items in order to have adequate sign space.
- Maintain a clean classroom and pick up after yourselves.
- Students should dress appropriately for instruction sessions. There should be no use of hats, headphones, and sunglasses during class sessions.
- Food and drinks are not to be consumed during a class session.
- Students who use inappropriate language, share inappropriate images, or in any way behave inappropriately will be subject to appropriate discipline.
- Students should always maintain a positive attitude toward themselves, others, assignments, and activities.

• If you have an emergency or need special accommodations due to a health condition, family situation or special circumstance notify the instructor as soon as possible.

Deaf Culture Project: Each semester you must complete one Deaf Culture Project. For this assignment you will attend a virtual event or in person deaf event. There will be various deaf events hosted by the ASL club and different deaf events posted on our google classroom/ on class whiteboard. After you attend you will write a response paper about the experience. If you are unable to attend an event you must make arrangements with your instructor 30 days prior to the due date. The prompt will be posted on google classroom with further description on this project. The Deaf Culture Project is worth a total of <u>10%</u> of your final grade; not completing this project could result in lowering your final grade by a full letter! The project is designed to provide you with more exposure of Deaf Culture and expand your understanding of the Deaf Community and American Sign Language.

ASL Showcase: Each year our ASL Club hosts an annual ASL Show. The showcase has a theme and consists of song translations, ABC stories, poetry, etc. As part of the Honors ASL IV class, you are expected to perform and participate in the showcase. Participation includes showing up to after-school rehearsals and making arrangements with any sports or extracurricular activities for your attendance. If you are unable to be involved in the show, you must notify your instructor 60 days in advance. You will be required to complete an alternative assignment in replacement of your attendance and participation. Please contact me with any questions.

Academic Honesty: If a student is cheating they will receive an <u>automatic zero</u>. Cheating is subject but not limited to asking for answers, copying from someone's class work/ homework, or online platform. Please refer to your student handbook to find out what academic dishonesty means. Additionally having a cell phone out during an assessment will result in an <u>automatic zero even if you are not on your phone!</u>

Grading Policy: Grades will be a combination of participation, presentations, classwork, quizzes, projects and a variety of tests. If you are absent, it is your responsibility to turn in all necessary assignments in a timely manner. Grades earned in this class are A, B, C, D, and F. To pass this class, you must earn a 70% or higher.

Electronic Devices: I understand the need for constant communication with friends and family who are not as fortunate to be in our wonderful ASL class. However, during class any cell phones, smartphones, music devices, and smartwatches will not be allowed.

Redoing Assignments & Late Work: Late work for quizzes and projects will only be accepted up to <u>two</u> <u>weeks</u> after the due date. Redo presentations and comprehension assessments must be conducted during office hours. Any late homework that is received will be given a 50% deduction in grade. Students can redo any homework or assessment for a higher grade within <u>two weeks</u>. Students must wait <u>48 hours</u> before attempting to retake an assignment. If a student is submitting late work they will be required to complete the "Late Work Sheet" on the classroom wall. The forms will be entered on a weekly basis. Written finals are not subject to retakes. **No makeup work (retakes or missing assignments) will be accepted for the last three weeks of each semester**.

Google Classroom: Throughout our course we will be using google classroom as a forum to communicate, interact, and turn in work. Each student is required to be able to have access to google classrooms in order to turn in projects and receive weekly announcements as well as reminders.

Missing work: In the situation, a student is absent from class and was unable to complete classwork there will be two outcomes. If the student has an excused absence verified with the attendance office, they will receive an NA for the assignment. This means the assignment will not affect their overall grade negatively or positively. If the student has an unexcused absence they will receive a 0 on the assignment. Students will be held responsible for making up missing assessments within two weeks of the assignment due date. They will need to make arrangements with the instructor directly to schedule a time.

Remind: During our course, I will be sending reminders to you through the Remind App. Make sure you have signed into our classroom in order to receive important dates and information.

Pocket Points/ Charging Station: For this school year, we are utilizing the charging station to earn pocket points. At the beginning of each class, you can scan the QR code and fill out the Google form to earn pocket points. After filling out the QR code you need to leave your phone in your assigned phone cubby number. There are extension cords that can be utilized to charge your phone during the class session. You are not required to use the charging station however by doing so you can earn points towards various rewards. This policy is to support you and your classmates to stay off your phone during class time. Each day you put your phone in the charging station you will earn a point. The points can be used towards rewards including homework passes, extra credit, and dropping the lowest quiz score.
