English Department

8th Grade Language Arts

During the month of May and the remainder of the year, the eighth grade students will have the opportunity to explore careers that interest them as well as those in which they have natural ability, through the use of an on-line survey. Through research, students will select a career and explore the steps that they would need to take in order to be on the right path to the career that have chosen. Students will research to find a detailed description of the career as well as statistical information on the career. A focus will be placed on the colleges and training necessary to get the student to their goal. After students have completed their exploration of their interests, they will synthesize and organize their results. Included in this unit will be several nonfiction based literature pieces from the textbook that can be viewed as examples of careers through the ages.

7th Grade Language Arts

The 7th grade classes just ended Unit 5 with the production and assessing of board games made by the students that centered on how the elements of the plot affect each other. We are also finished with the ELA section of the CAASP test (Whew!)

The final unit of study for the 7th grade is "Stereotypes." In this unit students will analyze the author's use of characterization for their characters and their actions based on the stereotypes assigned to them by themselves and others. Students will also assess the relevancy of the text. The novel selected will be The Outsiders by S.E. Hinton. In order to understand the characters' stereotypes, the students will first be looking at their own. The students will be keeping a dialectical journal throughout the book, analyzing the poem recited in the text, evaluating character choices and writing an argumentative paragraph, and will end the tasks with an argumentative essay questioning whether the novel is still relevant today. Most classes will end the unit by viewing the movie.

Math Department

- To finish off the year the Integrated Math 1 students will be studying polynomials, factoring, and quadratics. They will explore various applications of parabolas in the real world, such as in satellites and in a car's headlights.
- The 7th grade classes are finishing up volume and surface area of prisms and cylinders and will then move on to statistics and probability to finish up the school year. The current project involves students preparing circle graphs for the percentage of students who earned Gold, Silver, Bronze, Maroon, and Coyote cards for the 2nd Trimester. The last 2 projects will involve original designs using geometric shapes and tessellations.
- The next unit of study for Math 8 is on Data Analysis and Displays. They will learn about scatter plots and lines of fit. We will finish off this unit with a survey project. Students will survey their classmates and then show their knowledge of various types of data displays. We will end the year by learning about square roots and watching an inspirational movie called Stand and Deliver.
- Our last math meet of the year will be on Thursday, May 21st. The students will be working in groups to construct the highest tower possible from plastic straws and just a few other materials. Come watch our mathematicians at work!

History Department

The History Department would like to thank all 7th and 8th Grade students and parents for a wonderful year. As we head into the remaining 6 weeks of school, we would like to encourage all students to keep up the hard work because there is still a lot of work to be done.

The 7th Grade history students are currently learning about the Renaissance and Reformation. Students will explore how the focus on thought led to the Scientific Revolution and the Age of Exploration. Students will take their knowledge of exploration and head to the Americas to learn about the Aztec, Inca, and Maya civilizations. Students will end the year with a study of the Age of Enlightenment which will be a perfect transition into their 8th Grade study of history.

The 8th Grade history students are currently focusing on the causes of the Civil War. They are exploring the myriad of reasons as to why our country went to war with itself. Next, they will transition to the study of the Civil War. Finally, students will end the year with a focus on Reconstruction and the aftermath of the Civil War.

P.E. Department

The Canyon Hills PE department has been teaching a track and field unit since the middle of April. Each PE class will rotate through a series of events: sprints, long-distance, long jump, discus, shot put, relays. The beginning of May will conclude our instruction, and our track meet will begin on May 7th. Each child will pick two events to participate in. This exposure to track and field should lead to many athletes wanting to participate in high school track and field and/or the cross country team.

Science Department

Seventh grade classes are wrapping up the year by learning about some of our body's organ systems. We will be studying a real (sheep's) heart, brain, and eye during our lab work.

Eighth graders are winding up their year with the famous Canyon Hills "Rube Goldberg Project." Ladies and gentlemen, launch time for your catapults is the end of May/first week of June!
