Deadly Mid-air Collision in Washington D.C Causes Uproar

Sixty-Seven individuals were found dead at the Potomac River, Reagan's Washington National Airport, on the night of Wednesday, January 29th, 2025. This deadly collision was caused by a midair collision between two aircrafts; one of which was a military-operated helicopter. The aircrafts involved were a Bombardier CRJ700, known as American Airlines Flight No. 5342 and an Army Sikorsky H-60.

There were 60 passengers and 4 crew members aboard the Bombardier, while 3 soldiers aboard the Sikorsky H-60. The Army Helicopter belonged to Fort Belvoir, located in Virginia, and was taking training flights at Runway 33. During this collision, they were understaffed at the runway, which only held one out of two air traffic control workers needed on a runway. As these training flights were taking place, it was moments before the Bombardier was supposed to land, and the air traffic control workers present at the Airport had asked if they could shift over to a shorter runway.

The pilot aboard agreed to this request and could be seen shifting the plane's path to the shorter runway. However, barely any moments later, the soldiers aboard the Sikorsky H-60 were asked if they could see the Bombardier, to which they were able to identify it. That was under a minute before the collision. As the air control workers were telling the soldiers aboard the Army aircraft to wait for it to pass, they collided.

The nation, including the government, has responded in a plethora of ways as it was released that the 60 passengers aboard Flight No. 5342 of American Airlines consist-

ed of Olympic Skaters and Educators. The Trump Administration made an official response at the White House on Friday January 31st. 47th President Donald Trump declared that this is a grieving hour in America at the loss of the 67 aboard the two aircrafts. He also said that no matter who is working, they must be the smartest they can be, and he will plan to restore all faith to American Air Travel. Yet he has faulted and blamed the H-60 for flying too high, 325 feet in altitude, yet in the briefing room at the White House, he did not have the evidence to support his original claim.

On the morning of February 2nd, 2025, a Washington, D.C. memorial was being held for the 67 victims involved in the collision while the remains of the crash were still being pulled out and identified in Potomac River. As of February 10th, everyone has been identified.

"Commercial airlines are affected and especially the department of transportation who handles air traffic control. They are tightening up their shifts and regulations. Military personnel is also affected because of the error in flight space and mishandling. I don't think it's going to affect the usage but more of the following protocols and regulations. I don't think any legislation will come out of this. It really is following rules and guidelines that are already in place. This crash was preventable but there was human error in this. Where you are allowed to fly and aware of surroundings is very key, no legislation is going to affect preventative measures. The only

way the economy in my opinion would be affected is by air travel and the demand on the consumer side. I haven't seen a huge dip in the purchases of flight tickets, so I don't foresee any huge changes. Military spending on the government side has always been high, so I don't see any huge changes there as well" said Brendan Davila.

To end the tour, students headed inside the gym to get ready for the next activity, which was a competition game between other


groups where students had to be the first group to stack ten cups using only balloons.

happening since President Trump was first elected and continuing new his second term.


In Texas, many have gathered at the state capitol to protest Presidents Trump’s administration policies on immigration. The protest was part of a nationwide

Some of the new characters introduced are lackluster and did not seem to serve any real function to the story other than just being in the background or hyping up the main characters. Much of the movie


is carried by action scenes and setups for content that will involve bringing in long-awaited characters to the MCU, with many of them being ones that should have been there from the beginning of the franchise.




Valentine’s Day is celebrated annually on February 14th and is recognized as a day of love and romance. However, its origin is unclear and not fully understood.


