INTRODUCTION TO CULTURE

- Culture comprises the shared practices, technologies, attitudes, and behaviors transmitted by a society
- Cultural traits include such things as food preferences, architecture, and land use
- Cultural relativism and ethnocentrism are different attitudes toward cultural difference

CULTURAL LANDSCAPES

 Cultural landscapes are combinations of physical features, agricultural and industrial practices, religious and linguistic characteristics, evidence of sequent occupancy, and other expressions of culture including traditional and postmodern architecture and land-use patterns





CULTURAL PATTERNS

- Regional patterns of language, religion, and ethnicity contribute to a sense of place, enhance placemaking, and shape the global cultural landscape
- Language, ethnicity, and religion are factors in creating cetripetal and centrifugal forces

TYPES OF DIFFUSION

 Relocation and expansion - including contagious, hierarchical, and stimulus expansion - are types of diffusion





HISTORICAL CAUSES OF DIFFUSION

- Interactions between and among cultural traits and larger global forces can lead to new forms of cultural expression; for example, creolization and lingua franca
- Colonialism, imperialism, and trade helped to shape patterns and practices of culture

Things to Know!

CONTEMPORARY DIFFUSION

- Cultural ideas and practices are socially constructed and change through both small & large scale processes such as urbanization and globalization. These processes come to bear on culture through media, technological change, politics, economics, and social relationships
- Communication technologies, such as the internet and the time-space convergence, are reshaping and accelerating interactions among people; changing cultural practices, as in the increasing use of English and the loss of indigenous languages; and creating cultural convergence and divergence.





DIFFUSION OF RELIGION & LANGUAGE Language families, languages, dialects, world religions, ethnic cultures,

- and gender roles diffuse from cultural hearths
 Diffusion of language families, including Indo-European, and religious patterns and distributions, can be visually represented on maps, in charts and toponyms, and in other representations
- Religions have distinct places of origin from which they diffused to other locations through different processes. Practices and belief systems impacted how widespread the religion diffused
- Universalizing religions, including Christianity, Islam, Buddhism, and Sikhism, are spread through expansion and relocation diffusion
- Ethnic religions, including Hinduism and Judaism, are generally found near the hearth or spread through relocation diffusion
- Acculturation, assimilation, syncretism, and multiculturalism are effects of the diffusion of culture






I. Cultural Hearth Diffusion of Language (and Religion)

Cultural Hearths

- A hearth (aka: node) is a point of origin of something (idea, trend, language, religion, etc.)
 - Cultural hearths are the areas where civilizations first began. They radiated the customs, innovations, and ideologies that transformed the world.





I. Cultural Hearth Diffusion of Language (and Religion)

Relocation Diffusion

- Ideas, culture, and things spread from point of origin and then crosses a significant physical barrier
 - Barrier can be ocean, mountain range, desert, or a LONG distance.
 - They can spread language, technology, religion, disease and culture



I. Cultural Hearth Diffusion of Language (and Religion)

Expansion Diffusion

- There are three types of expansion diffusion: contagious, stimulus, hierarchical.
 - These are ways that things spread through direct OR indirect exchange. This can be with or without migration.




I. Cultural Hearth Diffusion of Language and Religion



- Language and religion have used both relocation and expansion (remember, there are 3 types!) of diffusion to spread across the world!
- The two largest language families are: Indo-European and Sino-Tibetan.


 Imperialism/colonialism were primary ways for language and religion to diffuse.

• Europeans sought land to build empires, for natural resources/economic gain, or to convert others to their religions.




Pronunciations are as expected, with the following exceptions:

- (Athens is pronounced normally, unlike Athens IL or Athens KY, which are pronounced AY-thens)
 (Vienna is pronounced normally, unlike Vienna IL or Vienna SD, which
- are pronounced vie-EH-nuh)



Religious Diffusion


- Religions have also diffused through expansion and relocation.
- All religions can be traced to one area, or hearth, and spread to either places nearby or far and wide.






Religious Diffusion

- Additionally, many religions can spread because followers are expected to spread the religion, by evangelizing or helping to convert those who do not follow their belief system.
- Again, imperialism helped diffuse religions, both universalizing and ethnic.









Fig. 6-1a: Over two thirds of the world's population adhere to Christianity, Islam, Hinduism, or Buddhism. Christianity is the single largest world religion.






Universalizing Religions:


- a religion that attempts to appeal to all people, not just those living in a particular location

- Followers distributed across the globe







V. Ethnic Religions

Ethnic Religions:


- religion that appeals primarily to one group of people living in a place

- Followers highly clustered into certain regions or countries






