Effective compacts:

- Link to goals of the school improvement plan
- Focus on student learning skills
- Describe how teachers will help students develop those skills using high-quality curriculum and instruction in a safe and supportive learning environment
- Share strategies parents can use at home
- Explain how teachers and parents will communicate about student progress
- Describe opportunities for parents to volunteer, observe, and participate in the classroom

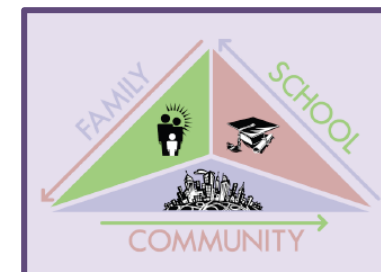
Communication About Student Learning

District Goals

In the Classroom

The third grade team will work with students and their families to support students' success. Some of our key ways to connect our classroom instruction and best practices with the school goals will be to:

- Set goals for the class and the grade level
- Read informational and narrative texts
- Provide opportunities daily for children to read, examine, and critically evaluate narrative and expository text
- Encourage students to answer higher level, text dependent questions
- Focus on the 4 Cs: Collaboration, Critical Thinking, Creativity, and Communication
- Provide small group instruction in both ELA, Math, and Designated ELD
- Incorporate project based learning
- Use Step Up to Writing strategies
- Expect students to speak in complete and complex sentences
- Provide intervention and enrichment activities (differentiated instruction)
- Provide scaffolding strategies for limited-English proficient students across the curriculum
- Integrate technology into instruction across the curriculum
- Support the character education program
- Support No Excuses University through our classroom universities

At Home

Here are some ideas of how families can support students' success:

- Listen to your child read for 20 minutes each day and ask questions to check for understanding
- Expect your child to read and write in complete and complex sentences
- Practice with your child daily multiplication facts
- Check homework for accuracy
- Have your child practice All the Right Type and IXL (see school website)
- Practice keyboarding skills
- Attend ELAC (English Language Advisory Council) Meetings
- Attend school-wide events and conferences
- Have your child wear his/her college t-shirt on Mondays
- Look through Rustler folder every Monday
- Check your child's backpack and agenda daily for school correspondence; respond when appropriate
- Email the teacher with concerns/questions
- Talk to your child every day; ask about their day at school
- Talk to your child about future goals
