Tip: Use short stories with picture support. Provide three written answer choices. Read choices aloud. Point to the written answer choices. Model asking and answering questions about key details in the story.
Listen to an Oral Presentation (RI)	Listen as I tell you about Listen carefully. You will hear the information only once. When I am finished, I will ask you some questions. • Focus on basic facts, key details, and simple comprehension, using "who," "what," "where," "when," and "why" to guide the questioning. Example: • What is the picture about? Who is in the picture? What color is the? • Where does the (live, sleep)? • What is one thing that like(s) to do? Why is important? Tip: Provide pictures related to the informational text presentation. Ask three questions about the presentation (RI text). The answer choices may be pictures or text. Model answering questions using the language from the presentation.

Read a Short Informational	Now you are going to read a text on your own. I will ask you questions about what you have read.
Passage (RI)	 Focus on basic facts, key details, and comprehension, using "what," "who," "how," and "why" to guide the questioning.
	Tip: Provide a short informational passage. A picture related to the passage may be included. Ask at least three questions about key details in the passage.
Read a Literary Passage (RL)	 Now you are going to read a text on your own. I will ask you questions about what you have read. Focus on comprehension using "who," "what, "where," "when," and "why" to guide the questioning. Ask questions to describe characters, settings, and major events in the story. Tip: Provide a short passage. Model asking and answering questions about the story elements.

Informational Passage (RI)	 you have read. Focus on comprehension using "who," "what," "where," "when," and "why" to guide the questioning. Ask questions to identify main topic and retell key details of the text.
