BARGAINING AGREEMENT EFFECTIVE JULY 1, 2016

BACKGROUND

The present Collective Bargaining Agreement between the Chino Valley Unified School District and the Associated Chino Teachers (A.C.T.) expired on June 30, 2016. Pursuant to Article 2.1 of the Agreement, A.C.T. gave notice to the District regarding its initial proposal for a Successor Collective Bargaining Agreement and a public hearing was held on October 20, 2016.

Based on Board Policy 4143.1, Public Notice - Personnel Negotiations and Article 2.1.1 of the A.C.T. Collective Bargaining Agreement, the District is hereby announcing to the public its initial proposal for a Successor Collective Bargaining Agreement to be effective July 1, 2016.

The District has given notice to A.C.T. regarding its initial bargaining proposal for the Successor Collective Bargaining Agreement and submits the following:

Article 7: Class Size

The District proposes to incorporate additional classes to the exception to the daily teaching ratios.

The District proposes to incorporate the Memorandum of Understanding for K-3 grade span adjustment program into the contract.

Article 13: Leaves

The District proposes to impose deadlines for the consideration of leave requests to ensure that staffing needs are met.

Article 14: Hours

The District proposes to modify the instructional time/workday in order for staff to fulfill professional responsibilities.

The District proposes to adjust the grade reporting timeline to ensure for the timeliness and the accuracy of student grades.

The District proposes to ensure equitable staff representation and workload by all faculty on school level committees.

Article 15: Placement, Assignment, Reassignment, Transfer, & Vacancy

The District proposes to modify the transfer timeline to account for accurate staffing.

The District proposes to clarify language to ensure for a fair and consistent process when there is a reduction in staff.

Article 18: Child Development Programs

The District proposes to clarify and update language consistent with staffing needs.

Appendix C

The District proposes to provide equitable stipends for the junior high schools.

The District proposes to incorporate Transitional Kindergarten as part of the grade level cluster.

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I. Background

The Local Agency Special Tax and Bond Accountability Act ("Accountability Act") was enacted by California State Legislature through Senate Bill 165 to provide accountability measures for any local special tax and/or bond measure subject to voter approval on or after January 1, 2001. According to the requirements of the Accountability Act (Sections 50075.1 and 53410 of the Government Code of the State of California), an annual report must be filed by the local agency levying a special tax and/or issuing a bond measure on or before each January 1, commencing January 1, 2002 and shall contain a description of the following:

- (1) The amount of funds collected and expended to fund authorized facilities.
- (2) The status of any project required or authorized to be funded by the special tax and/or bond measure.

The information contained in this Special Tax Accountability Report has been compiled and is being presented for Fiscal Year 2015/16 pursuant to and in accordance with the requirements outlined in the Accountability Act.

II. Authorized Facilities

The qualified electors within CFD No. 4 authorized the School District to approve the levy of a special tax and the incurrence of bonded indebtedness in an amount not to exceed \$12,000,000 for Improvement Area A and \$18,000,000 for Improvement Area B to provide for the cost of the financing, design, construction, installation, rehabilitation and acquisition of certain school facilities, including repayment of existing indebtedness, the payment of statutory school fees, and incidental expenses.

The authorized school facilities are generally described as elementary, junior and high school buildings and facilities for grades kindergarten through twelve (12), including equipment and furnishing thereof, with an estimated useful life of five (5) years or more.

The construction, installation, rehabilitation and acquisition of certain authorized school facilities described have been financed through the use of lease payments, installment purchase payments or other payments (any such payments shall be hereinafter described as the "Certificates of Participation" or "COPs"). CFD No. 4 may repay in part or in full existing indebtedness, including COPs issued by the School District, to finance authorized facilities.

As of the date of this Report, no bonds have been issued. Special Taxes were levied by CFD No. 4 for the first time in FY 2007/08.

III. Collection of Special Taxes and Expenditures

A separate account is held by the School District for the deposit of special taxes levied by the CFD and for the disbursement of authorized expenditures. The following table provides a description of the collection of special taxes and the funds disbursed for authorized expenditures in FY 2015/16.

INTERNS

The Board of Education may employ interns as necessary to fulfill the need for sufficient instructional staff and to provide future teachers an opportunity to link teaching theory with practice in order to meet state credentialing requirements. In addition, the District may employ teachers who already possess a preliminary or clear credential and are pursuing a credential in a different specialization as interns for positions that require such other credential.

The Superintendent or designee may enter into partnership agreements with one or more approved teacher preparation programs sponsored by colleges or universities and/or may provide a District intern program with approval of the Commission on Teacher Credentialing (CTC). Any intern program in which the District participates shall be aligned with the preconditions and program standards adopted by the CTC.

The Superintendent or designee shall make reasonable efforts to recruit an intern from an approved program within the region whenever a teacher with a preliminary or clear credential is not available for a position requiring certification. (Education Code 44225.7)

SPECIAL EDUCATION STAFF

Qualifications/Assignment of Special Education Teachers

Any teacher assigned to serve students with disabilities shall possess an appropriate credential or other authorization issued by the Commission on Teacher Credentialing (CTC) that specifically authorizes him/her to teach students with the primary disability within the program placement recommended in the students' Individualized Education Program (IEP). (5 CCR 80046.1-80048.9.4)

The Superintendent or designee may request that the CTC issue a special education limited assignment teaching permit which authorizes a qualified special education teacher, with his/her written consent, to serve outside the specialty area of his/her credential. If the teacher has not yet obtained permanent status, the Superintendent or designee shall assign one or more experienced educators in the special education subject area(s) of the permit, who have at least three years of full-time teaching experience in each of the subject area(s) of the permit, to provide guidance and assistance to the permit holder. (5 CCR 80026, 80027.1)

As needed, the District may apply to the CTC for an emergency permit for resource specialist services pursuant to 5 CCR 80023.2 and 80024.31.

When requesting either a limited assignment teaching permit or an emergency resource specialist permit, the Superintendent or designee shall submit a Declaration of Need for Fully Qualified Educators that satisfies the requirements of 5 CCR 80026 and has been approved by the Board at a regularly scheduled Board meeting. If there is a need to immediately fill a classroom vacancy or a suitable credentialed teacher cannot be found after a diligent search, the Superintendent or designee may, as appropriate, apply to the CTC for a short-term staff permit pursuant to 5 CCR 80021, a provisional internship permit pursuant to 5 CCR 80021.1, or, as A last resort, a credential waiver.

Individuals providing related services to students with disabilities, including developmental, corrective, and other supportive and related services, shall meet the applicable qualifications specified in 5 CCR 3051-3051.24. (5 CCR 3051; 34 CFR 300.34, 300.156)

- 4. Providing consultation, resource information, and material regarding students with disabilities to staff members in the regular education program and the students' parents/guardians
- 5. Coordinating special education services with the regular school programs for each student with disabilities enrolled in the resource specialist program
- 6. Monitoring student progress on a regular basis, participating in the review and revision of IEPs as appropriate, and referring students who do not demonstrate appropriate progress to the IEP team
- 7. Providing services for secondary students that, emphasize academic achievement, career and vocational development, and preparation for adult life

Any student who receives resource specialist services shall be assigned to regular classroom teacher(s) for a majority of the school day, unless his/her IEP team approves enrollment in the resource specialist program for a majority of the school day. (Education Code 56362; 5 CCR 80070.5)

Resource specialists shall not simultaneously be assigned to serve as resource specialists and to teach regular classes. (Education Code 56362)

The resource specialist shall possess the qualifications specified in Education Code 56362.

Caseloads

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that caseloads for special education teachers are within the maximum caseloads established by law, the collective bargaining agreement, and/or the comprehensive plan of the Special Education Local Plan Area (SELPA) in which the District participates.
