The Second Interim Financial Report (submitted under separate cover) presents actual data as of January 31, 2018. This report must be approved and certified as positive, qualified, or negative by the Board of Education and submitted to the County Superintendent of Schools by March 15, 2018. The three certifications are defined as follows:

- 1. **A Positive Certification** means that a Local Education Agency (LEA) will meet its financial obligations for the current **and** two subsequent fiscal years.
- 2. **A Qualified Certification** means that an LEA may not meet its financial obligations for the current **or** two subsequent fiscal years.
- 3. **A Negative Certification** means that an LEA will not meet its financial obligations for the remainder of the fiscal year **or** for the subsequent fiscal year.

The Second Interim Report is being presented to the Board of Education for approval with a positive certification.

Any costs associated with this request shall be covered by the community member(s) submitting the request, and/or booster club(s) and the Associated Student Body.

- 1. Beginning February 2, 2018, the public was notified through the local news media, the District social media outlets, and the District website of the 30-day opportunity to submit recommendations for naming of this facility.
- 2. Upon the conclusion of the 30 days, at the next regularly scheduled Board meeting, the Board shall hold a public hearing on the proposed name change and entertain public comments.
- 3. At the following regularly scheduled Board meeting (April 19, 2018), the item shall come before the Board, the Board will again entertain public comments and take action on the item.

BACKGROUND

The Title I funding for the Instructional Aide-Bilingual/Biliterate and Bilingual Typist Clerk I positions within Chino Valley Unified School District are expiring. Additionally, the need for the Instructional Aide-Special Education/SH, is no longer required. It has been determined that it is necessary to discontinue certain classified services for the 2018/2019 school year due to the need and lack of funds. This requires the elimination of 1.65 full-time equivalent positions. Resolution 2017/2018-46 outlines the recommendation for discontinued services.

RECOMMENDATION

SCHOOL SHOOTING THREAT AT CHINO HILLS HS

BACKGROUND

Education Code 46392 allows the District to request authorization to disregard lost attendance days in the computation of average daily attendance (ADA) when the ADA of a school district is decreased due to the imminence of a major safety hazard as determined by the local law enforcement agency.

On the evening of Thursday, February 15, 2018, Chino Hills HS administrators were alerted of social media postings where a shooting threat was made to the Chino Hills HS campus for Friday, February 16, 2018. This threat came one day after the Marjory Stoneman Douglas HS shooting in Parkland, Florida. As a result, more than 27% of the student population was absent from Chino Hills HS on February 16, 2018. Local law enforcement investigated the claim and found no credible threat.

Nutritional standards adopted by the District for all foods and beverages sold to students, including foods and beverages provided through the district's food service program, student stores, vending machines, fundraisers, or other venues, shall meet or exceed state and federal nutritional standards.

School staff shall encourage parents/guardians or other volunteers to support the District's nutrition education program by considering nutritional quality when selecting any snacks which they may donate for occasional class parties and by limiting foods or beverages that do not meet nutritional standards to no more than one such food or beverage per party. Class parties or celebrations shall be held after the lunch period when possible.

TO REINFORCE THE DISTRICT'S NUTRITION EDUCATION PROGRAM, THE BOARD PROHIBITS THE MARKETING AND ADVERTISING OF FOODS AND BEVERAGES THAT DO NOT MEET NUTRITION STANDARDS FOR THE SALE OF FOODS AND BEVERAGES ON CAMPUS DURING THE SCHOOL DAY. (7 CFR 210.30)

Guidelines for Reimbursable Meals

Foods and beverages provided through federally reimbursable school meal programs shall meet or exceed federal regulations and guidance issued pursuant to 42 USC 1758(f)(1), 1766(a), and 1779(a) and (b), as they apply to schools. (42 USC 1751 Note)

In order to maximize the district's ability to provide nutritious meals and snacks, all district schools shall participate in available federal school nutrition programs, including the National School Lunch and School Breakfast Programs, to the extent possible.

Program Implementation and Evaluation

THE SUPERINTENDENT DESIGNATES THE SCHOOL SITE ADMINISTRATION ALONG WITH SUPPORT FROM THE HEALTH SERVICES AND NUTRITION SERVICES

DIRECTORS TO BE RESPONSIBLE FOR ENSURING THAT EACH SCHOOL SITE COMPLIES WITH THE DISTRICT'S WELLNESS POLICY. (42USC 1758b; 7CFR 210.30

The Board SUPERINTENDENT OR DESIGNEE shall establish a plan for measuring ASSESS THE implementation AND EFFECTIVENESS of this policy AT LEAST ONCE EVERY THREE YEARS. The Superintendent shall designate at least one person within the district and at each school who is charged with operational responsibility for ensuring that each school site implements this policy. (42 USC 1758b 7 CFR 210.30)

THE ASSESSMENT SHALL INCLUDE THE EXTENT TO WHICH DISTRICT SCHOOLS ARE IN COMPLIANCE WITH THIS POLICY, THE EXTENT TO WHICH THIS POLICY COMPARES TO MODEL WELLNESS POLICIES AVAILABLE FROM THE U.S. DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE, AND A DESCRIPTION OF THE PROGRESS MADE IN ATTAINING THE GOALS OF THE WELLNESS POLICY. (42 USC 1758B)

THE SUPERINTENDENT OR DESIGNEE SHALL INVITE FEEDBACK ON DISTRICT AND SCHOOL WELLNESS ACTIVITIES FROM FOOD SERVICE PERSONNEL, SCHOOL ADMINISTRATORS, THE WELLNESS COUNCIL, PARENTS/GUARDIANS, STUDENTS, TEACHERS, BEFORE- AND AFTER-SCHOOL PROGRAM STAFF, AND/OR OTHER APPROPRIATE PERSONS.

To determine whether the policy is being effectively implemented districtwide and at each district school, the following—THE BOARD AND THE SUPERINTENDENT OR DESIGNEE SHALL ESTABLISH INDICATORS THAT WILL BE USED TO MEASURE THE IMPLEMENTATION AND EFFECTIVENESS OF THE DISTRICT ACTIVITIES RELATED TO STUDENT WELLNESS. SUCH indicators shall be used MAY INCLUDE, BUT ARE NOT LIMITED TO:

- Descriptions of the District's nutrition education, physical education, and health education curricula AND THE EXTENT TO WHICH THEY ALIGN WITH STATE ACADEMIC CONTENT STANDARDS AND LEGAL REQUIREMENTS
- 2. Number of minutes of physical education instruction offered at each grade span
- 3. Number and type of exemptions granted from physical education—EXTENT TO WHICH OTHER FOODS AND BEVERAGES THAT ARE AVAILABLE ON CAMPUS DURING THE SCHOOL DAY, SUCH AS FOODS AND BEVERAGES FOR CLASSROOM PARTIES, SCHOOL CELEBRATIONS, AND REWARDS/INCENTIVES, COMPLY WITH NUTRITION STANDARDS

- 4. Results of the state's physical fitness test AT APPLICABLE GRADE LEVELS
- 5. An analysis of the nutritional content of SCHOOL meals AND SNACKS served IN ALL DISTRICT PROGRAMS based on a sample of menus AND PRODUCTION RECORDS
- 6. An analysis of the nutritional content of SCHOOL meals AND SNACKS served IN ALL DISTRICT PROGRAMS based on a sample of menus AND PRODUCTION RECORDS
- Student participation rates in ALL school meal AND/OR SNACK programs, INCLUDING THE NUMBER OF STUDENTS ENROLLED IN THE FREE AND REDUCED-PRICE MEALS PROGRAM COMPARED TO THE NUMBER OF STUDENTS ELIGIBLE FOR THAT PROGRAM
- 7. EXTENT TO WHICH FOODS AND BEVERAGES SOLD ON CAMPUS OUTSIDE THE FOOD SERVICES PROGRAM, SUCH AS THROUGH VENDING MACHINES, STUDENT STORES, OR FUNDRAISERS, COMPLY WITH NUTRITION Any sales of non-nutritious foods and beverages in fundraisers or other venues outside of the district's meal programs
- 8. A DESCRIPTION OF OTHER DISTRICTWIDE OR SCHOOL-BASED WELLNESS ACTIVITIES OFFERED, INCLUDING THE NUMBER OF SITES AND/OR STUDENTS PARTICIPATING, AS APPROPRIATE Any other indicators recommended by the Superintendent and approved by the Board

AS FEASIBLE, THE ASSESSMENT REPORT MAY INCLUDE A COMPARISON OF RESULTS ACROSS MULTIPLE YEARS, A COMPARISON OF DISTRICT DATA WITH COUNTY, STATEWIDE, OR NATIONAL DATA, AND/OR A COMPARISON OF WELLNESS DATA WITH OTHER STUDENT OUTCOMES SUCH AS ACADEMIC INDICATORS OR STUDENT DISCIPLINE RATES.

IN ADDITION, The Superintendent or designee shall report to the Board at least every two years on the implementation of this policy and any other Board policies related to nutrition and physical activity PREPARE AND MAINTAIN THE PROPER DOCUMENTATION AND RECORDS NEEDED FOR THE ADMINISTRATIVE REVIEW OF THE DISTRICT'S WELLNESS POLICY CONDUCTED BY THE CALIFORNIA DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION (CDE) EVERY THREE YEARS.

THE ASSESSMENT RESULTS OF BOTH THE DISTRICT AND STATE EVALUATIONS SHALL BE SUBMITTED TO THE BOARD FOR THE PURPOSES OF EVALUATING POLICY AND PRACTICE, RECOGNIZING ACCOMPLISHMENTS, AND MAKING POLICY ADJUSTMENTS AS NEEDED TO FOCUS DISTRICT RESOURCES AND EFFORTS ON ACTIONS THAT ARE MOST LIKELY TO MAKE A POSITIVE IMPACT ON STUDENT HEALTH AND ACHIEVEMENT.

Posting Requirements NOTIFICATIONS

Each school shall post the District's policies and regulations on nutrition and physical activity in public view within all school cafeterias or in other central eating areas. (Education Code 49432)

THE SUPERINTENDENT OR DESIGNEE SHALL INFORM THE PUBLIC ABOUT THE CONTENT AND IMPLEMENTATION OF THE DISTRICT'S WELLNESS POLICY AND SHALL MAKE THE POLICY, AND ANY UPDATES TO THE POLICY, AVAILABLE THE PUBLIC ON AN ANNUAL BASIS. HE/SHE SHALL ALSO INFORM THE PUBLIC OF THE DISTRICT'S PROGRESS TOWARDS MEETING THE GOALS OF THE WELLNESS POLICY, INCLUDING THE AVAILABILITY OF THE TRIENNIAL DISTRICT ASSESSMENT. (EDUCATION CODE 49432; 42 USC 1758B; 7 CFR 210.30)

SUBJECT: STUDENT EXPULSION CASE 17/18-18

BACKGROUND

The Board of Education has established policies and standards of behavior in order to promote learning and protect the safety and well-being of all students. When these policies and standards are violated, it may be necessary to suspend or expel a student from regular classroom instruction.

Expulsion is an action taken by the Board for severe or prolonged breaches of discipline by a student. Except for single acts of a grave nature, expulsion is used only when there is a history of misconduct, when other forms of discipline, including suspension, have failed to bring about proper conduct, or when the student's presence causes a continuing danger to him/herself or others.

A student may be expelled only by the Board of Education. The Board shall expel, as required by law, any student found to have committed certain offenses listed in Education Code 48915.

Based upon the recommendation of the Expulsion Hearing Administrative Panel, it is recommended the Board of Education approve student expulsion case17/18-18.

BACKGROUND

To provide current standards-aligned instructional materials to the students in the Chino Valley Unified School District, as mandated by the state of California, the textbooks specified below is proposed for adoption.

The selection and piloting process for these materials involved representative teachers from each of our junior high schools and included six English Learner teachers and two Special Education teachers. The Office of Secondary Curriculum and Instruction secured samples of state-adopted textbooks. Teachers evaluated the samples and chose to pilot two publishers' materials.

Each of the materials were evaluated using criteria established and prescribed by the California Department of Education's 2015 Adoption Toolkit for English Language Arts/Literacy English Language Development. The criteria included: quality of match to California standards; quality of lesson design; quality of teacher and student materials; provisions for universal access; and overall quality of the programs. Teachers evaluated all textbooks and selected one publisher that best matched District goals and needs. The recommended textbooks were piloted for a 6-week period in grades 7 and 8.

All recommended instructional materials shall be available for public inspection at the District Samuel R. Burton Professional Development and Media Center from April 12-19, 2018.

These textbooks were presented to the Curriculum Council and A.C.T. has been consulted.

Consideration of this item supports the goals identified within the District's Strategic Plan.
