## A. Course Title: Cartooning II

- Description: The course is designed to give the student a working knowledge of editorial, political, and social issues as stated within a cartoon format. It will develop a method for the student to state his/her point of view through the use of an artistic media.
- Purpose: This course will expand and clarify students awareness. It is designed to help the students develop a sense of community and social awareness by giving them the tool of personal creative statement on issues as the students interpret them.
- 3. Length of Course: One semester. May be repeated for credit up to a maximum of 20 credits.
- 4. Grade Level: 10 -12
- 5. Prerequisites: Cartooning
- 6. Credit: 5 units of elective credit toward graduation.

## B. Course Objectives:

- 1. The student will be able to draw with pen and ink as measured by teacherset standards.
- 2. The student will be able to compose a line drawing from a written idea, as judged by the teacher.
- 3. The student will be able to demonstrate acceptable use of ink wash, as judged by the teacher.
- 4. The student will be able to demonstrate acceptable pictorial compositional skills, as judged by the teacher.
- 5. The student will be able to differentiate between a political, social and editorial cartoon, as judged by teacher constructed test.

- demonstrated and measured by standards set by the teacher.

V. Suggested Activities to make the Course More Meaningful to Students

Skill(s) Or Areas Included In The Course	Suggested Activities
Knowledge of cartoon techniques.	1. The student will select a political or social issue from school or local community and draw a cartoon that illustrates the student's personal point of view. This will help clarify the student's feelings and personal values.
Creating cartoon style, and individual technique.	2. The student may compile a sample book of political (national or local) cartoons. This will help the student understand the issue of cartoon style and technique to make the statement required in the medium.
Using ink line to characterize a cultural, political, or social issue.	3. The student will keep a "line diary" in which he/she will illustrate with line only the situations that occur in the student's personal environment on a daily basis. This will help the student recognize the deadline element that is an integral part of a professional political cartoonist's vocation.
Writing a short biography of a political cartoonist.	4. The student may research and study the life of a famous political cartoonist either living or dead. This will help the students recognize and appreciate: the skills needed in order to make a living as a professional political cartoonist.
