

Introduction to Theater Syllabus

Welcome to Intro to Theater! First and foremost, I'm so happy to have you in my class this year. I look forward to getting to know you and watching you grow as a performer and individual.

Course Description: This introductory course is designed to help students establish a foundation in drama. Students will learn and develop acting techniques—such as voice control, timing, characterization, blocking, and movement— as they read and study dramatic literature, explore musical theater, and learn various theatrical elements. More than anything, the course is designed to enhance theater appreciation and provide students an outlet for self-expression and creativity.

This is a hands-on class, and students *WILL* perform *DURING* the class period. As beginners, students may be anxious or nervous about performing in front of their peers. Anyone who has ever acted (myself included) remembers those initial anxieties and insecurities well. Learning to combat and conquer those anxieties is as important a skill to learn as any other skill or technique I can teach. In the words of Spanish novelist Miguel de Cervantes, "To be prepared is half the victory." Before performing, students will have ample time to rehearse and will have participated in learning activities related to the performance. By the end of the year, my goal is for each student to have increased their knowledge and appreciation of theater, as well as their confidence as an individual.

Materials:

- Any necessary prop or costume pieces (per project, recommended).
- A Theater Notebook (any single subject notebook will work) for performance notes & feedback.
- All scripts, handouts, and videos will be provided.

Grade Breakdown: Grades in theater are assigned through rubrics that assess/measure the understanding and implementation of skills and knowledge. Talent level will hopefully rise as technique is learned, however, talent will never be a qualifier for a higher grade.

<u>live Performance Review:</u> All students are required to see a live play or musical during the course of each semester and write a critique. It can be a virtual performance, live performance, or prerecorded live performance. Students are encouraged to attend Ayala Theater performances, but may also attend a play

of their own choosing elsewhere in the community. Students will submit a written review of the play, which will count toward their semester grade.

Media Permission: Per district regulations, parents will need to give permission for students to watch videos, recorded plays, and all other recorded visual media. By signing this syllabus, parents/guardians agree to allow their children to watch the following media presentations as part of our *Introduction to Theater* curriculum, acknowledging that they may withdraw consent at anytime, and for any reason:

- Broadway: The American Musical, Episodes 1-5
- Into The Woods

- Phantom of The Opera
- Les Miserables

If any other media permissions are required, a permission slip will be sent in the form of a Google Form before each unit. Parents and guardians will only need to supply their email address and name on this form; filling out this form will be considered permission for the student to watch the designated media unless otherwise designated on the form.

Respect: The most important and foundational expectation in my class is that all students are treated with and treat others with respect. Theater is the ultimate collaborative effort: it requires a high level of communication and cooperation from everyone involved, from the director, to the stage manager, to the actors, all the way to the ticket takers. Everyone involved in this class plays a vital role. I will do my best to assume the best intentions in all students, and I will encourage students to do the same; however, language and behavior that is mean-spirited and disrespectful has no place in our classroom. Our class is a community that is dependent on the respect, participation, and enthusiasm of each member for the success of the whole.

Responsibility: Take responsibility for your work and your actions. Be on time to class and ready to work, with all required materials. Students are required to maintain journals. Homework assignments are due at the beginning of class when the bell rings.

Effort: This class requires you to work both inside and outside of class to complete assignments. Accept assignments without complaints and do your best on all work. In this class, you will get out what you put in. Keep all electronic devices out of the classroom unless otherwise directed.

Restroom and Food Policy: Please use passing periods to take care of restroom and water fountain needs. In the case of an emergency, students must ask permission to use the restroom and take the appropriate pass. No food or drinks are allowed in the classroom unless I give express permission (water is the exception).

Cell Phone and Technology Policy: NO CELL PHONES ALLOWED. There is no reason for you to have your cell phone out in my class. If I see it, you will be given ONE verbal warning. If I see it again, I will confiscate it, and it will be sent to the vice principal's office. NO VIDEO RECORDING OR PHOTOS of anyone in the classroom, student or teacher, unless you have been given explicit permission from myself and all those being recorded/photographed. Recording or photographing someone without their permission, regardless of intent, is an egregious violation of privacy and will be treated as bullying.
