Every year since 1980, the Milkcan game has been played between Chino High School and Don Lugo High School. This game determines which school keeps the can.



CHINO VALLEY'S NEW POLICY

Chino Valley unified school district proposed a policy to make it a requirement to inform parents if their child requests a pronoun change or to use a different restroom other than the one, they are "assigned to." The school board wants to implement this new rule as soon as possible.

The proposition initially passed but San Bernardino County Judge Thomas Garza granted a temporary restraining order last week putting the policy on hold.

In late August, Attorney General of California, Rob Bonta sued chino valley over its gender identification policy, he claims that it violates student's civil rights.

The Chino Board argues telling parents about the pronoun/name change makes them more aware of their child's mental health, but the opposing side says this policy "outs" students, strips them of their privacy and can put them in danger.

The next court hearing on the issue was scheduled for Oct. 13.
