
The students and staff at Chino High School will participate in an earthquake drill, the Great Shakeout on October 20th, 2022.

The Great Shakeout is practice for when a real earthquake hits California. Students are required to go under their desks and wait for instructions from their teachers. The teachers will then guide the students to a safe evacuation area.

The Great Shakeout will take place at 10:20 am, between second and third period. After the shakeout students and teachers will return to their classes and continue with their third period classes.

Ryan Meneses, a math teacher of four years at Chino High, said the drill usually lasts about 30-40 minutes.

Principal of Chino High School John Miller explained how important it is for Chino High to take this earthquake drill seriously as it is preparing us for the real thing. Miller has been a principal at Chino High School for about 4 years now.



Staff and students will evacuate to the football field during the drill. Once everyone is on the football field, the staff that make the search and rescue team will practice their procedures to prevent a real emergency. To be part of the search and rescue team, certain staff members are selected and then asked if they are comfortable being part of the team and handling the materials needed.

The Great shakeout is a response and dedication to prepare for an emergency. Miller claimed that if an earthquake were to occur, the best strategy for people to remain calm is if they are familiar with the process of a lockdown. Therefore, following the instructions of a teacher during any kind of drill is very important.

LUNCH PASSES ARE IN



Since Monday September 26, Chino High School began to offer lunch passes to those students who met the grade requirements.

The requirements for a lunch pass include a minimum of a 2.0 GPA and no failing grades during the 6-week grading period, as well as having your parent or guardian sign a contract for you to apply.

The person in charge of the lunch passes is the admin secretary, Ms. Prescott. Students must talk to her to obtain a lunch pass sticker.

Everybody who gets a lunch pass also gets a unique number. The sticker changes depending on the semester. There is no limit to using the lunch pass. In order to leave the school, security will check your I.D. for the unique sticker.



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
