
Enlarging



 You may use the grids on the second sheet of "Enlarging," or you may make your own. Clear acetate, plastic, or tracing paper work well for the smaller grid.




2. Attach the ½" grid on top of the picture you want to enlarge.



3. Trace the main shapes on the ½" grid. You may have to hold your papers againsta window with light coming through it to help you see.

4. Attach a clean sheet of paper on top of the larger 1" grid. The lines should faintly show through.



Copy the shapes you see in each square of the smaller grid onto the larger paper.



 Remove the grid, make corrections, and add detail. If the picture you've enlarged was done originally by someone else, remember to sign it "enlarged by" or "copied by" in front of your name.




- 1. You may wish to darken the lines on the larger 1" grid.


Upside Down

2. Start drawing the lines you see at the edge of the picture closest to you. Think only about the direction the lines are going and how far apart they are.



3. Don't think of the lines and shapes as though they are specific things like feet, eyes, or a head. They really are just lines and shapes on a piece of paper. Only when you are completely finished should you turn your drawing right side up.


